## INCUMBENT'S MESSAGE

I am writing this on the eve of our winter break as I do a last push to leave parish administration in good order. A part of me is satisfied getting things done and a part of me is already wearing sun screen and enjoying the “bathtub” - the heated adult pool at our resort.

It reminds me of the importance of balance and rest in all of our lives. And while we know the need for setting priorities and having healthy boundaries there is a tension for many people. We know that we live in a time pressed culture and that we should not live as driven people and yet we feel satisfied and are applauded by keeping a busy schedule. That is also why we can get sick too often, never resting enough to really get better, or we can forget things or get sharp in responding to others or....you name your default stress behaviour.

This Lent we are going to have a Spirituality Afternoon on Saturday, March 17<sup>th</sup> from 2 – 4:30 pm. Consider attending and gifting yourself with a chance to pause and reflect.

I believe God is always speaking to us; we simply do not still ourselves long enough to hear. I know how grounded I feel when I actually do pray before beginning my day. And there is indeed blessing in offering the events of each day back to Christ using “the examen” for evening prayer.

Are some of the words and concepts that I have written about in the previous paragraph new? Even more reason to come out on March 17<sup>th</sup>. I will do some teaching about the lives of the saints and the way that they prayed. We will leave time to actually do one of the styles of prayer. We will conclude by praying The Stations of the Cross in the church.

A recent spiritual exercise that I did was very meaningful. I used Joyce Rupp’s *The Cup of our Life* and worked through two of her daily devotions. I would like to share it with you. One day was about allowing God to use us to be a mirror of God’s far greater Love. The companion devotion was about recognizing that, in order to be that mirror, we need to set limits so that **we** can be replenished. After time spent in silence the questions intended to guide the journal writing time were: **I am most aware of God dwelling within me when....** and then **What keeps me from having enough time to resource my inner self?**

We cannot give to others if we do not first take care of our own self. Many people of faith are called to jobs or volunteering where they risk compassion fatigue. A strong prayer life helps us stay connected to the source of strength and joy even when the work might fall short.

So back to my winter break...Scott and I will enjoy sunny Florida (we hope) and see you soon!

## **FINANCIAL CHURCHWARDEN'S REPORT**

Just what does the financial churchwarden do? I thought I should take a little space to describe my activities. St. Paul's does not have a "treasurer" per se, but our Parish Executive Committee consists of five people: the Incumbent, Rev. Debbie, Rector's Warden Mike Sindrey, Peoples' Warden Dave Martin (also chair of the Property Committee), Deputy Churchwarden Marilyn Hutchison (responsible for Special Events), and me, the Financial Churchwarden.

Over the past year, I have appreciated the help of Deputy Churchwardens Wanda Dickey and Ann Copeland.

I try to keep our Sunday Collection Counters doing their job in conjunction with the Bookkeeper, Heather Burton, as accurate reports must be kept. In turn, the Envelope Secretary, Cathy Turgeon, maintains her records of your weekly donation through the collection plate, or through PAR (Preauthorized Remittance) on a monthly basis.

Working with the bookkeeper, we keep tabs on the church bank accounts (savings and chequing), to ensure that we do not become overdrawn at any one time. I do this nearly every day. Heather does the same.

I also work with our Auditor, Jim Houghton, CA, particularly at audit time in January, as the audit must be complete for the annual Vestry Meeting. Jim also interviews Cathy Turgeon and our Bookkeeper.

We try to keep all our various supplier accounts up to date so that these people are happy doing the work they do for St. Paul's. One of the challenging accounts in this regard is the money we pay to the Toronto Diocese to pay our incumbent, Rev. Debbie, and our diocesan

allotment which we pay to support our role within the diocese. It is a challenge because we no sooner pay off \$7,000.00 or \$7,500.00, if we are lucky, and then on the 15th day of each month the current bill comes in, in the amount of \$8,000.00 or so.

This is where events like our Valentine Dinner and Dance, Mother's Day dinner, Strawberry Festival, Back to Church dinner in September, our Thanksgiving Dinner, and the Christmas Family dinner play a very important role in an effort to make up any shortfall. Of course our Plant Sale in the spring, and the Christmas Bazaar really help!

As a former municipal mayor and councillor, I have a very good understanding of what is involved in the budgetary process. I had some 23 years of holding municipal and regional council office, and I very much enjoyed the budgetary work involved. This year, Rev. Debbie assigned me the task of preparing our 2018 church budget. It was thoroughly reviewed by the Parish Executive Committee in November, December, and January, before it was adopted and approved at the Annual Vestry Meeting on February 11, 2018.

As I said at the Vestry Meeting earlier this month, I feel that St. Paul's is in good shape financially, and we have turned the corner. Our January, 2018 total PAR donation was \$4946.00! We have never had an PAR amount this size donated to the church.

If we all do our part and give where we can, or want to, we will continue down this path!

## **BOOKS 'N THINGS IN THE LIBRARY**

### **EASTER AND AFTERWARDS**

On my first Good Friday in Taiwan, where I was working as an Overseas Volunteer, I was teaching in the senior (second year) kindergarten of Southgate Presbyterian Church. This was an experiment to see how it would work to teach the kids two half-hours worth of English per week. Although I spoke slightly more Chinese than the youngsters did "*ying-hwa*", -- which wasn't much on either side -- they were quick to catch onto what I'd teach (including a song to make the lesson "stick"). It also helped greatly that the minister, Mr. Sun, spoke fluent English.

That day I planned to teach three sentences: "Today is Good Friday"; "Sunday is Easter"; and "Easter is a happy day!" and then have them learn a song whose last line was "EASTER IS A HAPPY DAY". After I'd said the first sentence and Mr Sun had translated it so the kids knew what I was teaching them, one little boy raised his arms like Jesus on the cross and began speaking very seriously. No one told me what he was saying, but I think the laddie was explaining what Good Friday was all about -- in case the minister didn't know!



Later, when we sang the song, the children really enjoyed that last line. Indeed, they fairly shouted it! I put my hands over my ears, saying, "Oh, it is noisy!", which usually quietened them down. This time, however, the little mischiefs just put their hands over their ears and almost yelled, "EASTER IS A **HAPPY DAY!!!**" Well, they certainly had got the message!

Although Lent began while we were travelling through time and space in the last Library display, we have several books about that season. Then there are plenty of books and DVDs about Good Friday and Easter. By the way, "Happy Easter" in Mandarin Chinese is "*Foo-hwah djeh quy-le*" which means literally "Happy Rising-up Day"! I hope you do!



After Easter the display will change to *Stories of Jesus*.

This will include books from one of the time-travel series, *Alice in Bibleland*, which you can find among the books in the Children's section of the Library. There is also a DVD set called *The Storykeepers* from the Young People's shelves. This last shows Christians hiding from the wrath of the Emperor Nero after the Great Fire of 64 A.D., and telling the stories of Jesus to each other. Nero is a rather comic villain in this cartoon series. For a better idea of what he was like, I recommend the classic movie *Quo Vadis* (DVD and video) with the late Peter Ustinov as the insane ruler. In the catacombs beneath Rome, the Christians hear Peter the Apostle tell stories of his experiences with the Lord. The believers sing a hymn in the caves, and also in the arena as the lions appear. This really gets Nero -- indeed, it's enough to drive the mad emperor stark staring bonkers!!

There's an interesting story about Deborah Kerr, the actress who had the role of Lygia, the heroine of the movie. An interviewer once asked her if she'd been scared in the arena. After all, there she was, tied to a stake, with nothing between her and an enraged bull but her faithful servant! "No," she replied, "because I'd read to the end of the script." The minister who told that story (after kindly reminding the congregation that there was a copy of the movie *Quo Vadis* was in the Church Library) added that we also have "read to the end of the script" in the Bible and know how things will end!

Another film, *Apostle Peter and the Last Supper*, shows the first disciple, while awaiting execution, telling some Romans of his experiences with Jesus from the time that his brother Andrew tells him that they've "found the Messiah" to the Last Supper. This is the second of three films on a DVD put out by PURE/FLIX.

Finally, on another disc entitled *Magdalena, Released from Shame*, Mary Magdalene tells some other women about being with Jesus. First she relives how he healed her, driving out the seven devils which tormented her. Then we hear how He helped other women, like the one who was taken in adultery, or the woman with the issue of blood, as well as the one He healed of a bent back on the Sabbath.

These will continue through April and May, along with some new interesting and intriguing book titles like *Bad Girls of the Bible*, *Famous Jerks of the Bible*, and *Hey! That's Not What the Bible Says!*

We had an impromptu Christmas play with each table being assigned a part of the Nativity Story from Luke's Gospel. Ask Bob Boyle about being a shepherd!

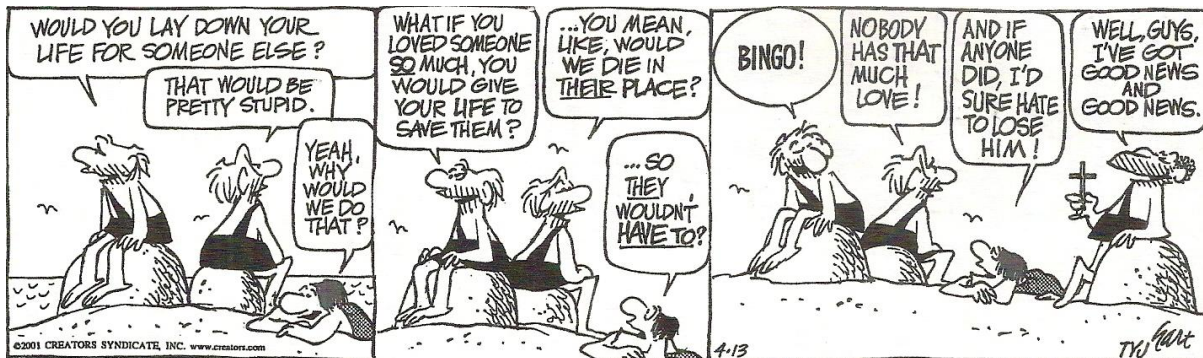
