DEBBIE'S DESK

The statistics are pointing to an alarming reality. Race-based attacks against minority groups are on the rise. One of the usual targets has been the Jewish people. Much of the antisemitism that Jews have faced has been reinforced by a misunderstanding of Holy Scripture and especially the Holy Week narrative. I offer you this very well-written and thought-provoking post by Sara Parks that I downloaded from Facebook. She called it a Public Service Announcement for Christians at Easter.

"As a person whose professional speciality is Judaism in the Second Temple period, I have to point out that there was no monolithic "The Jews" in the New Testament period (any more than there is a single "The Christians" now). There were extremely diverse expressions of Judaism, coexisting sometimes peacefully and sometimes in tension), and we see a whole range of them in the New Testament.

"Everything -- from messianic expectations (or total lack thereof), to Torah observance, to language, to views on the Empire(s) -- was a wide-ranging spectrum.

"To think one knows about "The Jews" based on the hotly charged polemics in the New Testament is extremely dangerous and has been literally deadly for Jews.

"All of the authors of the New Testament (with the possible exception of Luke/Acts who was perhaps an adult proselyte) were Jewish. Jesus lived and died a Torah-observant (and rather conservatively so) Jew. So did Paul. (See Eisenbaum, Fredriksen, Nanos, Gager, Zetterholm, Boccaccini, etc.)

"The idea of a messiah is Jewish. Reinterpreting current political events in light of Hebrew and Greek Scriptures was Jewish. Debating whether or not God was going to destroy the empire using a Jewish military or a Jewish martyr/sacrifice WAS JEWISH.

"When a text in the New Testament says "The Jews" (οἰ 'ιουδαιοι) it does not flat out mean "the Jewish people". It means, in context, things like "temple authorities," "rich elites," "a different group from me that I am mad at," "a group that is trying to urge pagans to full Torah Observance," "a group of Jews from a different place than my group (e.g. urban/rural)," or even "a group I am retroactively throwing under the bus because I'm scared of Rome crushing my group next."

"So many notions that come out of churches reading the New Testament without context are dangerous and deadly. So, do Christians all have to do PhDs in history? Of course not. But when in doubt (hint: that's all the time), interpret the New Testament in church in ways that are radically generous, and that result in *less* violence and hatred, not more.

"99.99% of the time if you're not a historian of antiquity you're getting the history part a bit wrong anyway, so just make a *choice* to interpret towards love and justice now, rather than pretend to make claims about "the Jews" in the Greco-Roman period. There are plenty of important lessons in those texts that are a lot more pressing than what this or that 2000-year-old minority Jewish group got wrong."

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The lesson on Sunday, April 30, 2023, was "The Church Grows" (Acts 9:26-31).

The craft we did that day, as carefully curated by Rev. Debbie, was a church with a congregation inside and our St. Paul's motto – 'everyone is welcome'.

I learned two things from this lesson. Firstly, that we need to spread the word and be disciples and preach. What we love about our church family, we should be

sharing with the community. If it fills our hearts, it may be what others need too. As Rev. Debbie says all the time, we need to be GOD with skin on.

Secondly, we are growing the next generation of Christians. We teach the kids each week and instill the word in each of the lessons we share with them.

My daughter (shown in the picture) loves coming to church each week. She LOVES attending Sunday school. She is disappointed when we can't make it and she has to miss out on her weekly teachings. If I'm being honest, at her age, I didn't enjoy attending church with my mom on Sunday. Our Children's Ministry was not engaging or fun, and while I attended each week until I was a young teenager, I can say that the love my daughter has for St. Paul's is a testament to our church culture and environment. We are growing the church by making it fun, engaging and welcoming to our youngest generations.

This lesson ended in prayer: "Thank you God, for the church in Bible times and our church today; in Jesus' name we pray. Amen."

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BOOKS 'N THINGS IN THE LIBRARY

The current display of *Overcoming Handicaps* will continue through much of June. It will change in time for July and Canada Day to tell about *Some Canadian Authors* in our collection.

Probably one of the best-known Canadian authors is Lynn Johnson, and her cartoon "*For Better or for Worse*". This long-running work shows Ellie and John Patterson in their Toronto home with their children Michael, Elizabeth, and April. Unlike other cartoon families, Lynn let the children grow up. When they started, Michael was a little boy and Elizabeth was a toddler.

As Lynn herself approached middle age, she wondered about having another child, herself. However, she let Ellie become the new mother and April was born. As Ellie's time approached, Lynn had many letters asking if the child would be born in the hospital or at home. Lynn got around this by having a bad snowstorm at the end of March, so that little April had to be born at home, delivered at home by a neighbour under instructions from the hospital.

Lynne also included controversial topics. Ellie's best friend, Connie, was an unwed mother. Her son, Lawrence, on reaching his teens, declared he was gay.

Elizabeth's favourite teacher was in a wheelchair. At the end of the series, April's high school class mixed with a group of mentally handicapped fellow students and learned to work with them.

After thirty years of drawing the adventures of the Patterson family and their friends, Lynn retired. By this time Michael was married with two children, Elizabeth had just wed her childhood sweetheart, and April was working out west and had a boyfriend there.

Another prolific Canadian author is Janette Oke. Many of her books about early settlement of Canada's prairies have been made into movies, some of which we have, as well. She has also written three books with American author Davis Bunn under the collective title *Acts of Faith*, telling the story of the early church from Jesus' resurrection to the conversion of St. Paul. In her most recent book in our collection, Janette Oke collaborated with her daughter Laura.

Another mother-daughter writing is a short story by Mary Peckover entitled *The Gospel Writer*, telling the background of the second gospel. *The Gospel of Mark*.

Mary's daughter, Ann, added a footnote, telling a few things, including what must have been an experience of Mark's at the time of Jesus' arrest.


Mary also wrote the script for a quiz show *Men of the Bible*. At the church she and her husband attended while snow-birding in Florida, several men, including

the minister, had great fun performing the work. Incidentally, when the elderly gentleman playing Methuselah was heading up the church aisle, Mary's husband walked beside him to be sure he made it. Would that make him Methuselah's "great-great-ever-somany greats" grandson?

Remember, people in the Old Testament lived to great ages, but Methuselah holds the record and is listed in the *Guinness Book of Records*. According to the book of Genesis, he lived to be 969 years and died "old and full of days". Someone back then had a sense of humour!

This production was video-taped and is included on the fourth disc of the production *Soul Liberty*, more about this later.

Mary's daughter, Ann, also wrote a



series of "explorations" for young people called *How We Got the Bible in English*. This work is in a looseleaf binder in the Young People's section of our library.

Soul Liberty was a Canadian TV production of thirteen half-hour shows (without commercials) showing the development of the Christian church from the fall of Rome to the present day. I have put these on four DVDs, with the last disc containing the final episode, followed by *Men of the Bible* and a programme about the Shakers entitled *I Don't Want to Be Remembered as a Chair*!

Canadian author Thomas B. Costain wrote several novels, including *The Silver Chalice*, a book about a man who is commissioned to make a holder for the cup Jesus used at the Last Supper. The book was made into a movie starring E.G. Marshall, Paul Neumann, and Canadian actor Lorne Greene.


Canada's soldier poet, John McCrae is best known for his poem *In Flanders' Fields*, but he wrote many other pieces. You will find these in a duo-tang folder with a picture of the author on the front. Some of his poems are included in the book *The Story of the Poppy*, which also includes works of several World War I poets, several of them Canadian.

Three Canadian comedians are next. Johnny Wayne and Frank Shuster wrote their own scripts and gave us many years of enjoyment with their quips. Both men were born and raised in Toronto. They performed internationally, very often on *The Ed Sullivan Show*. In fact, Ed wanted them to appear on every show, but Johnny and Frank realized that would mean living in the US, so they declined. Their agent was heard to mutter, "You'd make more money if you weren't so patriotic!"

We have two DVDs of Wayne and Shuster. The second one begins with another Canadian comedian, Don Herron, also known as Charlie Farquharson. In that sketch, called *Charlie Takes the Pledge*, he learns about stewardship in church.

These are just a few of the Canadian authors in our collection. This article is to be continued in the next issue of *The Chronicle*.

Thank you, the people of St. Paul's for your on-going contributions to the life of St. Paul's.

While our debt has been growing over the years, so have your contributions.

I report regularly to the Diocese's Parish Financial Support Committee which supports those parishes who have debt with the diocese. The good news is, there are more parishes with debt than there are without debt. The bad news is that because of this, the diocese cannot forgive our debt. We have been upfront with this committee for the last few years, so they know we acknowledge our debt and are working to pay it off. I feel it is important to be open and honest and work with supports to address our debt and how we will clear it. Clearing our debt will take time, as we are topping up our diocesan allotment every month to address this.

Special events such as the upcoming Plant Sale Extravaganza and of course our Christmas Bazaar are critical to our financial situation. When I see all that goes into these events, the time and the busyness that involves so many people and the talents of so many, I am reminded of Luke 12:34, "For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also".

We care about each other and that is the essence of St. Paul's! When I look out on the congregation on a Sunday, I see the talents of those who contribute in their own special way to strengthen St. Paul's.... and that is <u>EVERYONE</u>. ST. PAUL'S CEMETERY BOARD NEWS

The Cemetery Board is alive and well with lots of things happening! Whoever thought that becoming the Chair of the Cemetery Board would have the CRA chasing you? Not only that, but the BAO (Bereavement Authority of Ontario) also chases me, and sends me messages: some informative and some complaining.

Let me assure you and put you back to eternal sleep, especially our inhabitants of the cemetery, that everything is fine. Our reports are completed and submitted. We are fully accredited as a proper Canadian charitable organization with the CRA and our cemetery licence is intact with the BAO.

On the lively side of the Cemetery Board's operations, we have our annual Cemetery Sunday occurring on Sunday, June 4, 2023, at the 11:00 AM service. I hope many of you will attend. We even offer you a free lunch after the church service and cemetery ceremony.

This year we will be blessing our new 64-niche collunarium within our cemetery. Weather permitting, we will proceed across St. Paul's Crescent to the cemetery property. There, our ex-officio board member, The Rev. Debbie Dennis, will bless the new columbarium, amongst other prayers. If it rains, bring an umbrella!

After this celebration, you can tour the cemetery to visit the places of your resting friends and relatives, before coming back across St. Paul's Crescent to join the group in St. Paul's Parish Hall for a lovely luncheon. No charge as this is our "thank you" to you.

Executive members of the Cemetery Board met with our Cemetery Operator, Sanderson Monuments Company Limited, to determine just where the new columbarium should be erected. Decisions were taken, and the attached photos show the outline of two new columbaria. We are only building one at this time.

We thought it important for the future new members of the board that we establish a place for the second columbarium so that the balance of the overall design of the columbaria area would be preserved in perpetuity. This will ensure that the stonework which provides the foundations are all at the same level and of the same quality and design.

At this time, the new foundations were installed on Tuesday, May 16, 2023. The actual columbarium will be installed on June 1st. The landscaping around it will be completed after our Cemetery Sunday service.



On other notes, our cemetery board is in good financial condition thanks to you who support the cemetery and this charitable fund. When I was getting permission to build the new columbarium, our Diocesan Cemetery Co-ordinator raised questions that this addition had to be all approved by the BAO and the Anglican Toronto Diocese Executive Board before we could proceed. I was able to inform him that we had a Cemetery Improvement Fund, as well as the legislated Care and Maintenance Fund, which he was able verify, and everything was immediately cleared to proceed without any further red tape.

I would like to salute the work of our Cemetery Board Treasurer, Roger Rix, for his stewardship of the cemetery funds over the last 10+ years, I am sure. Roger has been the Cemetery Board Treasurer much longer than I have been a member of the Board. Thank you, Roger, and other long-standing members of the Board.

Our Board members are Roger Rix, Jan Chaytor, Mike Hogg, Mark and Kathy Hall, Jennifer Srigley, my wife, Ann, and me. Rev. Debbie is an ex-officio member. Our meetings are always attended by the principals of Sanderson Monument Company Limited.

WARDENS' MESSAGE

Mapleview Road Widening Update

The widening of Mapleview Drive west of Yonge Street has now been completed and the next phase in the further development of Mapleview is to widen it to four lanes east from Yonge to Prince William Way.

There was talk of the train tracks being twinned, therefore necessitating the road going under those tracks. The underpass is not the plan at this time, as the cost is prohibative, but the road will be widened sometime in 2024. The City of Barrie met with the parish executive and provided diagrams as to what would happen. Mapleview, between Yonge and the train tracks will be raised, such that our electric sign on Mapleview just outside the back door will need to be lifted. As well a retaining wall will be built between Mapleview and our property. There are small corner pieces that the City of Barrie needs to purchase from us and that has been negotiated, in consultation with the diocese of Toronto, who owns the land. During construction, the City will need to have their vehicles on our property to do the work and we have given our permission for that to happen.

What will also affect us is that there will be a median installed along Mapleview, such that upon leaving St. Paul's one will be unable to turn left onto Mapleview or cross Mapleview along St. Paul's Crescent heading north.

Yonge St. at Mapleview will also be widened and that is farther down the road in terms of timing. Suffice to say, we are located at a busy intersection that will only become more congested as our area continues to grow with so many houses being built to the east and the west of our location.

Property Update

Some of you may have noticed a pail in the foyer of the church in February/March. This was due to water/ice backing up and getting under the roof shingles. We had it inspected, and we will install electric cables on the roof in that area, so that the snow does not build up in the roof valley as it did this past winter. All the rain we had in April/early May was not a problem for us.

Winter was not too hard on us this year and we are grateful for that.

Fun Fact

When the new columbaria foundations were being installed in May, a portion of the foundation of the 2nd St. Paul's church (the first and the second churches both burned) was unearthed!!


