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EDITOR'S MESSAGE by George D. Timpson

Dear St. Paulians,

This is the eighteenth edition of *The St. Paul's Chronicle* and it deals with the three upcoming months of June to the end of August, 2024. It also shares the events which have occurred since our last edition which dealt with the four months of February to May, 2024, inclusive. I hope you enjoy reading it and take note of the events which are happening in our church life.

On a personal note, you may recall that my wife, Ann, and I were taking a cruise starting in late January from Cape Town, South Africa, arriving in Athens, Greece, in late March. Well, because of the war situation in the Red Sea and shipping attacks in the general Gulf of Aden area, Silversea abbreviated the cruise by cancelling the last two segments of the four segments which made up the total cruise. Thus, we disembarked the ship in Seychelle, and flew from there to Dubai, then to Toronto by way of Houston, Texas. At least we were all safe!

As well, on April 9, 2024, Ann suffered a very minor stroke and was taken to Royal Victoria Hospital by ambulance. She was released on April 16 and has been receiving care at home. We were very lucky that none of Ann's vitals were affected, and the physiologist has her doing exercises to strengthen her left arm and improve fine motor co-ordination. A very minor stroke such as Ann's is often referred to as a TIA (Transient Ischemic Attack). This does not affect the brain permanently, and a full recovery often occurs.

I would like to thank Rev. Debbie, Mimi Price, Mark and Kathy Hall, and my wife, Ann, for their contribution of photographs. These pictures show the atmosphere of the event and add a lot of lightness to a newsletter.


I hope that you will keep this copy of *The Chronicle* on your coffee table for frequent reference so that you are aware of what is happening at St. Paul's!

DEBBIE'S DESK

As part of *The Cast the Net* visioning process, the diocese has decided to "go back to basics" and have a two-year Season of Spiritual Renewal. I welcome this initiative because I believe it reminds us that in an increasingly post-Christian culture, we need to be bold and intentional in living out our faith.

I think our Jewish sisters and brothers can teach us some valuable lessons. The Chosen People have endured struggle and persecution throughout the ages. They have had to create practices to safeguard their identity and to pass their faith on to future generations. The family unit has been a key building block of their spiritual and cultural life.

Now, we too, as followers of Jesus need to develop commitment faith and lifestyle practices.

The Season of Renewal invites us to retrieve and revitalize four ancient spiritual disciplines: Prayer, Scripture, Worship, and Discipleship.

1. Prayer: We want to encourage widespread prayer across the Diocese – for individuals and church communities, on Sundays and in other meetings – so we begin this season focused on listening to and talking with God.



Form a prayer team of church members who will commit to *praying daily* for the spiritual renewal of our church members and parish, and who will meet together *monthly* to pray as a group.

- Get the prayer team to invite and encourage church members to write some of their own prayers for spiritual renewal. The team could select and share some of these prayers with the <u>Season of Spiritual Renewal coordinator</u> so that prayers can be shared across the Diocese.
- Include a prayer for the spiritual renewal of your members, your church and your Diocese in the Prayers of the People each Sunday for the next two years.

- Ask your children and youth to write prayers for renewal and pick some to share with the Season of Spiritual Renewal coordinator.
- Engage the children of your parish in creating artwork for each of the prayers included in the prayer resources we send to your church. You could display the art and the prayers on your church bulletin boards, around the altar and on your church website.
- Include short (written or extemporaneous) prayers for your church's spiritual renewal at the beginning of *all meetings* (e.g. wardens, building and property, outreach, study groups, worship committee and youth/children's ministries). Let's raise the profile of prayer for our renewal throughout this season!
- Share the prayer resources we send to your parish with all your church members to use in their personal daily prayers (e.g. <u>Prayers Through the Ages</u>, Prayers for Renewal from Across our Diocese).
- Encourage church members to participate in the workshops related to prayer offered as part of this season (e.g. ACTS: a pattern for personal prayer, The Daily Examen, The Daily Office, Christian meditation).

2. Scripture: We recognize the need for the study of scripture to be a part of our daily lives.

Here are some ideas for how to get your church engaging with scripture:

 Encourage church members to use a daily bible reading plan (Canadian Bible



<u>Society</u> and <u>Scripture Union Canada</u> or the daily lectionary), provide them with links to download these free plans and encourage them regularly in their reading with verbal and written announcements.

- Tell church members about the single-session workshops related to reading and studying scripture that will be offered as part of this season such as:
 - Starting a Missional Small Group Ministry
 - Using The Bible Project videos, The Bible Course (CBS) or Christian Foundations for an overview of scripture
- Invite a few church members to participate in a series of five online layleadership training sessions that will prepare them to lead an in-depth bible study group in your church using the Engage study resource on Luke's gospel.
- Make families aware of resources (CBS and SUC) for helping children and youth deepen their knowledge of scripture (e.g. CBS resources: <u>Fear Not</u> (8-to-12-year-olds, 12 chapters), <u>The Word for Families</u> (free and

printable download with activities. SUC resources: bible guides for children <u>Airlock</u> (youth), <u>Hotshots</u> (age 7-8), <u>Snapshots</u> (age 9-11), <u>Family Quest</u> (family reading, prayer and discussion).

• Start a small group ministry focused on the study of scripture.

3. Worship: We desire everyone in the Diocese to have a renewed joy and desire to engage in the worship of the Living Triune God.

Invite lay and ordained leaders to participate in some of the singlesession **workshops** and use some of the **print resources** that the Season of Spiritual Renewal will offer related to worship. Topics include:

o The Central Place of Worship (For priests or deacons who preach: a walk through three sermon outlines focused on texts related to the importance of worship)



- Making Space for Babies & Toddlers in your Church
- o Including Children and Youth in Worship
- o Enriching Prayer Ministry During Worship
- Including "Stories of Grace" in Worship
- o Thinking Theologically about Worship
- Enhancing Worship Music in a Small Church
- o Getting the Most Out of Your Sound System
- o Encouraging Spiritual Development in a Choir or Worship Band
- o Blending Contemporary and Traditional Hymns in Worship
- o Practical ways to Improve the Reading of Scripture in Worship
- $_{\circ}$ Making your Worship space more Accessible to Disabled People
- o Engaging All our Senses in Worship: Introducing Incense
- Engaging with Online Worshippers to build Authentic Community
- Highlight and invite church members to join in at least one of the *large* worship gatherings planned across the Diocese for 2025.
- Make use of sermon outlines related to worship that will be provided as a resource and made available to priests and deacons.

4. Discipleship and Evangelism: We want everyone to be confident in sharing their story of faith

- Tell lay and ordained leaders and other church members about the workshops on *training leaders* to host and lead a discipleship course, program or resource.
- Build a team (covering prayer support, hospitality personnel, table leaders and set-up people) in the church to offer (or join with another nearby parish to offer) a discipleship course on-site in fall 2024 and/or spring 2025. Some examples of such programs are:
 - o Being With (10 sessions)
 - o The Alpha Course
 - o Christianity Explored (10 sessions)
 - o Nua (8 sessions)
 - Christian Foundations (9 sessions)
- Develop a team of lay leaders who will participate in and then lead members of your parish in "Everyday Witness," a 10-week course written by Dean Stephen Hance



- Develop a small team with a passion for creation care to lead a study group, which builds upon the strong interest among millennials for care of the natural world.
- Encourage parishioners who may be shy to share their faith to join the online book study of *A New and Ancient Evangelism: Rediscovering the God Who Calls and Sends* led by Judy Paulsen.
- Encourage parishioners involved in outreach events, services and programs to participate in a workshop featuring a panel of deacons who can help your church build stronger bridges into your community.

BOOKS AND THINGS IN THE LIBRARY

As the credits roll at the beginning or end of a movie, you may well see a statement of where the action came from. For example, at the beginning of the movie *The Ten Commandments*, there is a declaration "Action based on the Holy Scriptures", as well as a book title *On Eagles' Wings*. This book takes the Israelites across the Red Sea. A sequel, entitled *This Evil Generation*, gets them

to the Jordan River and the death of Moses.

Another pairing of book and DVD is *The Lawgiver* going from the birth of Moses to his death on Mount Horeb.

We also have a boxed set of five DVDs called *The Kid's Ten Commandments* in which a boy named Seth learns God's rules. In addition, we have two movies about the life of Christ, one is called *King of Kings* and the other is *Jesus of Nazareth*.

Sometimes the movie sticks so closely to the book that you can visualize the action, other times you wonder if the script writer even bothered to read the book.

Another pairing is *One Foot in Heaven* about a Canadian from Stratford, Ontario, who became a Methodist minister in the United



States. The book is both biographical and auto-biographical. It is written by the minister's son telling of experiences in the various parishes.

We also have a movie called *The Inn of the Sixth Happiness* based on the book entitled *The Small Woman*. This tells about an English lady, Gladys Alyard, who goes to China as a missionary and is famous for guiding one hundred children across northern China during World War II. If you want to know more about Gladys, read *A London Sparrow*.

Two books in another boxed set are *The Nun's Story* and *The Shoes of the Fisherman*. When *The Nun's Story* was published, some convents were not happy that the book revealed the struggle of a Belgium girl to conform to the Holy Rule, which laid out how everything was to be done, and you couldn't change it or do something your own way. In *The Shoes of the Fisherman*, we find out how a Pope is elected. In this a pope of Russian extraction strives to prevent World War III between China and Russia.

Among our fiction books we have books and movies like *The Keys of the Kingdom* which tells of a Scottish priest working in China as a missionary. We also have blockbusters, spectacular movies and books. These include *The Robe* about the soldier who diced for Christ's robe, and *Won Eternal Life*. A sequel to the movie is *Demetrius and the Gladiators* which has clips from *The Robe*.

Another spectacular is *Quo Vadis* with Peter Ustinov as Nero, and *Ben Hur* which contains the outstanding chariot race. The sub title to *Ben Hur* is *A Tale of The Christ* because it begins with the Christmas story and ends with Easter. The book was written by Lew Wallace, an officer in the Union Army of the American Civil War. We also have a version of the book written by his great granddaughter which takes out some of the longer passages. Writers of the 1800's, tended to be long-winded.

Finaly, we have the books by C. S. Lewis in which young people go from our world to a fabled kingdom ruled by a lion named Aslan. The BBC dramatized four of these books and a few years ago, Walt Disney Studios filmed the same ones. These are *The Lion, The Witch, and The Wardrobe, Prince Castian, The Voyage of the Dawn Treader*, and *The Silver Chair*.

So come and enjoy our collection that you can both read and watch.

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ST. PAUL'S CEMETERY BOARD NEWS

So far this year, the Cemetery Board has held two general business meetings: January 17 and May 1.

An item which has dominated our agendae over the last year and a bit, was the request from InnPower Corporation for an aerial easement along the north side of the cemetery property for new hydro lines. As you are possibly aware, InnPower services the Town of Innisfil and the southern portion of the City of Barrie up to Mapleview Drive East. I am pleased to report that on March 14, 2024, the Risk and Governance Committee of the Synod Council of the Diocese

of Toronto approved the "transferring of an aerial easement to InnPower Corporation over the cemetery lands of St. Paul's Cemetery, Innisfil," without any conditions. Thus, this issue has reached its conclusion and construction will start soon.

As of March 31, 2024, we have sold two inground burial plots and one more niche wall plot. Two inground burial interments have been held.

The cemetery board has a net income in excess of \$13,000.00 so far this year.

A special highlight of our calendar year is the special cemetery Sunday Service scheduled for Sunday, June 2, 2024, at the 10:00 AM service. A catered luncheon is provided for our special guests and regular congregation in attendance following the service. An advertisement for this event outlining the program and menu is found elsewhere in this newsletter.


