

# DEBBIE'S DESK by The Rev. Debbie Dennis

I believe one of the important tasks to engage in after travel is to ask "What did I learn?" Or how does this different culture challenge me to grow? So, I have spent some time reflecting on Spain and especially on "The Catholic Monarchs," Ferdinand and Isabella, who captured my imagination for so many years.

Spanish mysticism is a powerful and profound way to express our faith in Christ Jesus. Part of what made this country so attractive to me for travel to was the piety of the faithful and the way it is expressed in major festivals and public pageantry. Because of the role of the Church, great art has flourished and the church buildings are stunning.

Yet the history of the Reconquista and following is problematic. King Ferdinand was a beloved military leader credited with expelling the Muslims out of Spain. And Queen Isabella is often considered one of the architects of the Inquisition. Together they sanctioned the call of the Church to expel Jews.

We believe that God is Love. The core of our faith is that Jesus Christ became the Word made flesh to demonstrate Unconditional Love on the cross. Then fundamentalism, or absolute certainly without doubt or dialogue, is anti-thetical to God's Love. The Spanish Reconquista and Inquisition were, in part, fueled by zeal to glorify God by creating a Roman Catholic Christian country. It also had a political, which ultimately was an economic component. The expulsion of the Jews meant that the debts the Church, the aristocratic class, and the monarchy would be forgotten. The loss of the Muslim population meant that medicine and higher learning were set-back.

Spain, at its best, was a model of peaceful co-existence between Jews, Christians and Muslims. Thankfully there are some sites which still exist as examples of the fruits of such collaboration. Cordoba is best known for the magnificent Mesquita or the Mosque-Cathedral. Here is some historical, background information about this sacred site.

According to traditional accounts a <u>Visigothic</u> church originally stood on the site of the current Mosque-Cathedral, The Great Mosque was constructed in 785 on the orders of <u>Abd al-Rahman I</u>, founder of the Islamic <u>Emirate of Córdoba</u>. It was expanded multiple times afterwards under Abd al-Rahman's successors up to the late 10th century. The mosque was <u>converted to a cathedral</u> in 1236 when Córdoba was <u>captured</u> by the Christian forces of <u>Castile</u> during the <u>Reconquista</u>. The structure itself underwent only minor modifications until a major building project in the 16th century inserted a new <u>Renaissance</u> cathedral <u>nave</u> and <u>transept</u> into the center of the building. The former minaret, which had been converted to a <u>bell tower</u>, was also significantly remodelled around this time. Starting in the 19th century, modern restorations have in turn led to the recovery and study of some of the building's Islamic-era elements. Today, the building continues to serve as the city's cathedral and <u>Mass</u> is celebrated there daily.

The mosque structure is an important monument in the history of <u>Islamic</u> architecture and was highly influential on the subsequent <u>"Moorish"</u> architecture of the western <u>Mediterranean</u> regions of the <u>Muslim world</u>. It

is also one of Spain's major <u>historic monuments</u> and tourist attractions, as well as a <u>UNESCO World Heritage Site</u> since 1984.

The photographs accompanying this article illustrate the touch of the divine in the Mesquita.



The Mosque-Cathedral obviously is not Jewish. However, Cordoba has a historic synagogue which also is an example of this collaboration. It is one of the few places of worship that was not destroyed during the Reconquista when Spain became a "catholic country." Muslim motifs are intertwined with Jewish symbols. Hebrew Scripture, including the psalms, are the basis of the beautiful calligraphy. Both Jews and Muslims do not use images of living things in their décor, believing that is God's work.

The Synagogue, situated in the heart of the Jewish Quarter of Cordoba, is unique in Andalusia and one of the three best preserved Medieval synagogues in the whole of Spain. According to the inscriptions found in the building, it was built between the years 1314 and 1315, and was in constant use right up until the Jews were finally expelled from Spain. A small courtyard leads to a narrow entrance hall. On the right, a staircase leads to the women's area and in front lies the main hall, which is rectangular in shape and decorated with Mudejar-style plant motifs. The supporting has three wall the women's tribune arches with exquisite decorative plasterwork including stucco panels with stylized geometric and floral patterns. The Jews were expelled in 1492, and afterwards, the building was used first as a hospital, then as the Hermitage of St. Crispin and finally, an infants' school. It was declared a National Monument at the end of the 19th century.







I hope one day all of you are able to travel to Spain. YouTube is a wonderful way to do so from your armchair! Catholic Spain is inspiring. And the periods of peaceful coexistence are even more so. We share one planet and while we may disagree, we can do so with respect and humility.

### **BOOKS AND THINGS IN THE LIBRARY**

If you open your Bible to the first chapter of the Gospel according to St Matthew, you'll find the Begats. My Dad used to jokingly call them "the Begatitudes". You know how they begin: "Abraham begat Isaac; Isaac begat Jacob and Esau" and so forth.

Of course we can't be like Poohbah, the "Lord High Everything Else" in the operetta *The Mikado* by Gilbert and Sullivan. He claims descent from a pre-Adamite family which traces its lineage back to a "protoplasmal primordial atomic globule." Now that's *really* BC, as in Before Creation!

But getting back to The Begats. Among all the masculine names, there are five feminine ones, set apart in brackets. Author Francine Rivers has five novellas (short novels) about these ladies. We have all of them in one volume whose title I have borrowed for this article, *Lineage of Grace*. Another author, Liz Curtis Higgs, includes three of them in the second volume of her trilogy *Bad Girls of the Bible*. In the book *Really Bad Girls of the Bible*, you will find Tamar, Rahab, and Bathsheba. Mrs. Higgs' technique is to tell the story of the "naughty lady" set in modern times, followed by an analysis of the story and questions that could be used in a discussion group. She calls Tamar 'Bad out of Desperation', Rahab 'The Mata Hari' of the Bible' and Bathsheba, 'The Bathing Beauty of the Bible'. But Rahab gets honourable mention in the Epistle to the Hebrews in chapter 11 where she's included among the heroes of the Old Testament. After Jericho, Rahab married an Israelite named Salmon. As you'll read in the book *Rahab*'s *Redemption*, they had a son named Boaz.

The Bible has nothing but praise for Ruth. The biblical book that bears her name reminds us that she wasn't an Isrealite by birth, but stayed with her mother-in-law, coming to people who worshipped God, rather than Chemosh and Ashtar, the deities she had been raised to acknowledge who had a nasty habit of demanding human sacrifice. Among the library items that we have about Ruth, two *The Song of Ruth* and *The Story of Ruth* are very dramatic about how people didn't accept her at first.

Well, I remember when I was in grade four, we got a new classmate. Her name was Elaine Svegeral. We were used to surnames like Smith, Jones, of Brown, and found Elaine's name strange, but we were friendly to her and welcomed a new friend.

Some people in Nazareth may have wondered if Mary was a bad girl, too. Another book by Liz Curtis Higgs, *The Women of Christmas: Elizabeth, Mary, and Anna* tells us more about the mother of Jesus. The Bible reminds us that Mary and Joseph were betrothed, which was tantamount to marriage. Although it was frowned upon, sometimes eager lovers jumped the gun, not waiting for the final ceremony under the wedding canopy. Perhaps some fellow villagers said, "Couldn't wait, eh?" when Mary's pregnancy was showing.

Joseph would have been older than Mary, but not the ancient greybeard that artists have depicted for centuries, who looks as if he has one foot in the grave and the other on a banana skin.

We have several items about these ancestresses of Jesus. Come and enjoy them.

Remember that items on display can be taken out, as well as things still on the shelves. Indeed, I love to see holes in my display.

There are so many reasons to gift a Prayer Shawl, also known as a Comfort Shawl, Friendship Shawl and various other titles. Here are a number of them:

- Support for someone who is experiencing challenges whether they be physical, emotional, spiritual, financial, medical, grief, etc.;
- Celebrations such as a new baby, Baptism, milestone birthday/anniversary/graduations, weddings, new home/moving, etc.

We also have small Pocket Prayer Cloths available that can easily fit into your pocket or purse and thus are portable enough to accompany you wherever you go. They can provide you with a tangible reminder that you are loved, supported and never alone. Great for supporting you during exams, medical appointments, surgeries, basically whenever you need them. Please help yourself. They are located in the front hall on the table at the bottom of the stairs along with a little prayer card to go with them.

Our Prayer Shawl Group meets every 2<sup>nd</sup> Wednesday of the month, 9:30 – 11:00-ish a.m. and we welcome anyone who would like to join us in this Ministry. We can supply you with yarn, needles/hooks and patterns. There are no quotas and skill levels required. ## PEOPLES' WARDEN'S & TREASURER'S REPORT

In the August edition of the Chronicle, I provided some statistics about giving and volunteering in Canada especially as it relates to church, and I said I would provide our local information in this edition. I will do that, but I have more information that I think is also important for us.

The Diocese of Toronto hosted a Parish Leader workshop in early November. There were a number of topics for discussion including:

- Understanding what Diocesan Stewardship data suggests about church growth
- Exploring Diocesan and Parish trends in attendance and giving
- Learning how online ministry seems to be contributing to growth in our Diocese
- Discerning how hybrid ministry can contribute to church growth.

On the Zoom call with the Diocese were several lay people and clergy, as well as diocesan staff. It gave us all the chance to hear good solid information and to ask questions. The 2.5-hour long call highlighted a number of things:

- People with "no religious affiliation" (none) are trending to become the majority segment of "faith" identifiers in Canada by 2031. In 2021, Anglicans made up 2.97% of Christian church goers. Roman Catholics led with 28% and the United Church with 3.18 percent, however, the United Church has declined the most. Those not attending church make up the majority.
- Less than 200,000 people identified as Anglican in the Diocese of Toronto in 2021 and on any given Sunday, less than 10% are in church. This decline has been consistent since 1996.
- Anglican identifiers in the Diocese of Toronto represent 1/6 of the Canadian Church.
- At least 50% of attendees are over age 65, however the next largest population grouping is that between 30 and 64, which shows family involvement. Youth under 30 years of age make up the remainder.
- Average Sunday Attendance across the diocese in 2023 was 17,379, including 4,589 online worshippers. Online worshippers are, for the most part, a result of COVID worship, as so many churches pivoted to offer virtual services when physical buildings were closed. If not for online worshippers, the Average Sunday Attendance would have decreased, so churches are working hard to tap into this market. Volunteer crunch is the largest inhibitor to this moving faster. What has not yet been determined at the Diocesan level is whether the givings from these individuals is at the same level as those who worship in-person.
- The average annual gift per giver (donation) is nearly \$1700. St. Paul's numbers are not far off...keep reading. In 2023 the diocese saw the first decline in the last dozen years. Most people in the Diocese and at St. Paul's give via envelopes rather than by PAR.
- Hybrid ministry is on the rise in the Diocese and it comes in a variety of forms. This enables congregations to use virtual formats in addition to inperson worship to respond to a tech-enabled culture. I was so proud to share that at St. Paul's we are using multi-media for our announcements as they are on the screen before the service and emailed to the parish, we are live recording our services and posting them to social media. There

was even some hesitation by other churches to having a screen in a church!


